In order to fully understand these factors, it is important to examine the cultural and societal trends of each era. Through the use of primary source documents and live interactive video discussions with National Park Service rangers and presidential historians from the National Archives and other presidential historic sites, our 2017 Presidential Primary Sources Program (PPSP) series will take students on a journey through our nation's history and allow them to view a President's key decisions through the life and times of their era.
